reservations early (like now, would be a good time - cancellation without penalty may be made up to 24 hours prior to the day of arrival). Group to obtain our special rates: \$89 per night single and \$94 double occupancy, INCLUSIVE of a \$1 per night housekeeping gratuity AND THE HOTEL'S ALL



AMERICAN BREAKFAST BUFFET. See TCF #35 p4 for scrumptious buffet details; note also that the then reported single/double room rate of \$94 is now reduced to \$89 for a single: "Doc" is watching out for us. Dreaded taxes bring the rates to \$100.24 and \$105.81 per night. You will need a major credit card to secure the first night. Hotel amenities include an outdoor heated pool & whirlpool, tennis courts, exercise room, massage services, two restaurants, bar, room service and in-room coffee maker, hair drier, iron, USA Today, & cable TV. The hotel also offers *complimentary airport transportation and free self-parking.*

Check in time is 3:00 p.m. but early arrivals will be accommodated as rooms become available. Check-out is 12:00 noon. And "Check-out" the balmy weather!! The Oct. average high is 86, low 55, rainfall .5". In addition, considering our Biloxi & Hot Springs experiences, "Doc" has proclaimed a "Total Refund Guarantee" if a Hurricane officially named "Therese" strikes downtown Tucson while we are there.

THE TOURS:

DAVIS-MONTHAN AFB TOUR OF AMARC AND THE PIMA AIR AND SPACE MUSEUM \$49 per person.

Tuesday 10 Oct. we will board our Gray Line motor coach with guide at 8:45 & will depart from our hotel at 9:00am. *A PHOTO ID IS REQUIRED* for admittance to Davis-Monthan AFB.

After the tour we will stop for lunch at the Golden Corral before returning to the hotel at 2:45 pm. Cost of lunch is on our own and there are several options to choose from.

Davis-Monthan was selected as an Army air base site in 1940. Some of our 41st Gp. troops trained there during WWII. After WWII the Army's San Antonio Air Technical Service Command established a storage facility for B-29 and C-47 "Gooney Bird" aircraft. The area was selected because of its meager rainfall, low humidity and alkaline soil, making it possible to store aircraft indefinitely with a minimum of deterioration and corrosion. It is now called the *Aerospace Maintenance and Regeneration Center (AMARC)* and has grown to include thousands of aircraft from all the U.S. services. In 1960 I added a WB-50 when our Guam based 54th Weather Reconnaissance Sq. was deactivated.

The Pima Air and Space Museum is home to the largest privately owned collection of historical aircraft in the country. More than 130 military and civilian aircraft, including our beloved B-25, are on display, along with engines, flight simulators, uniforms and other aviation memorabilia. Step right into the Douglas DC-6 used by both Presidents Kennedy and Johnson.

THE ARIZONA SONORA DESERT MUSEUM \$44 per person.

On Wednesday 11 Oct. our Gray Line motor coach will load at 8:15 for an 8:30am hotel departure to what The New York Times called, "The most distinctive zoo in the United States." It is also considered to be Southern Arizona's most popular visitor attraction. Nestled in the Tucson Mountain Park, the Desert Museum exhibits the living, outdoor world of nature found in the Sonoran Desert along with mountain lions, Mexican wolves and black bears in the Mountain Habitat. We'll enjoy close-up views in the walk-in aviaries of the birds and hummingbirds of the Sonoran Desert, a region that has more species of hummingbirds than anywhere in the United States. The Cave and Earth History Room explores 4.6 billion year's of our planet's history. There is a riparian habitat with underwater viewing and aquatic exhibits

in naturalistic habitats displaying rare and endangered aquatic and amphibious animals.

We'll arrive back at the hotel at 1:30 pm after lunch at the Museum. Again, cost of lunch will be on our own and you may order individually.

THE BANQUET:

Will be preceded by the obligatory "happy hour" starting at 5:30 pm on Wed. 11 Oct. with a "pay bar." At 6:30 pm the Banquet will be heralded by a color guard, bugler and chaplain, courtesy of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post No. 10188.

Your banquet meal choices are Prime Rib of Beef or Chicken Parmesan (Certainly they will accommodate Fred & Lee Deutsch & other's request for vegetarian). We're going to forego all that "succulent" hotel propaganda and hereby charge the hotel to provide quality por price charged...that is, flavorful and tender (done medium-rare for me) prime-rib and chicken that tastes...well, like tender Chicken Parmesan should. Accompanying dishes were not defined but, again, we'll trust they will be worthy of our discriminating tastes. Our culinary epicure Dick Sternberg, 396th will submit a postreunion critique.

OUR DISTINGUISHED GUEST SPEAKER is Major General DAVID M. JONES, USAF (Ret). He is one of only 16 survivors of the original 80 Doolittle Raiders. While flying a B-26 over Germany he was shot down and spent the remainder of WWII as a POW in stalag III. He was a test pilot & developed new procedures for testing of advanced aircraft. At age 92 (or so) Gen. Jones is still going strong, having recently toured New Zealand and Australia.

A personal note: It has been my pleasure to play an occasional round of golf with **Brigadier General Harold Confer, USAF (Ret),** an SR 71 Blackbird reconnaissance pilot at one time in his distinguished career.

"Do you know Gen. David Jones", I recently asked Hal, adding that Gen. Jones will be our featured Tucson Reunion speaker. "Yes, he was my commander in a B-58 [Hustler] unit at Carswell [AFB, TX]. He is someone I've always admired very much. Please extend my greetings to him." Well, who knows: perhaps...at about the time of our reunion would be nice...General Confer will consider trekking out to Tucson to visit with his old friend.

Bob, below is a reply from the folks I told you about yesterday that track vintage aircraft. Doesn't look too promising for "Paper Doll" at this point but who knows for sure... <u>aerovintage@yahoo.com</u>

Rolf, "FEA" is probably the Foreign Economic Administration and I believe "REC" was "Reclaimed" or "Reclamation," thus indicating it was scrapped. It will be difficult to ascertain with certainty that it was in fact scrapped, but 99% of B-25s (as well as other fighters and light/medium bombers) with combat time overseas when the war ended were scrapped in the local theaters. It was cheaper to scrap them there than fly them home and then scrap them. I don't know of any source that will shed more light on the fate of this airplane. Once the U.S. Gov closed the file the record ends. Sorry I can't help more. Good luck, Scott Thompson

Had 10 hr pass today so I went over to Lani Kai with Doc, Bill and Al. We killed a qt of burgundy there, took one with me along with 2 qts of bourbon. Party was well under way when I called Harry and he sent a carry-all down to take me to Kualoa where the 19th is stationed. We had a few drinks, a good bull session and went to bed. Wonderful breakfast with real cow milk to drink. I had called Casey so he came down to pick me up at 2.30 am. Drank wine whiskey & beer so of course I had a fairly good hangover besides being AWOL for a few hours. Nobody missed me however. OBITUARY: DONALD T. SNYDER, 820TH BOMBARDMENT SQUADRON

His eldest daughter, Sue Ferrence wrote: Dad died on April 15, 2006, at the age of 83. He had had a number of physical problems and multiple hospitalizations over the last three or four years but prior to that had really enjoyed relatively good health, mobility etc. He was even still able to play golf--and he did--several times a week. Up until the end, he continued to enjoy reading, crossword puzzles, war movies, John Wayne movies, and Benny Hill (preferring the racier English version). Our mother died about seven years ago and soon after Dad moved in with Ginny and Dean. Although he was hospitalized just prior to his death, he got his wish to come home. He longed for an old fashion and a beer and managed to drink a bit of both. Within less than a day and a half, he died peacefully, surrounded by family--just "going to sleep." Who among us could ask for more?

Dad was born and raised in Nazareth, Pennsylvania. In fact, except for his college and military years, he lived there his whole life. He was the only child of A. Russell ("Abe") and Kathryn ("Kit") Snyder. He and our mother graduated from Nazareth High School in the same class but did not begin dating until a few years later. Dad graduated from Penn State University with a degree in Animal Husbandry and our mother, Louise Lehr Snyder, received her nursing training at Abington Hospital (near Philadelphia, PA). After the service, Dad worked with his father in the family business started by his grandfather, Snyder Milling Company. After his father's retirement, Dad continued the business until his own retirement shortly after our mother's death. He was about 78 at the time.

Our parents were married 51 years and had three daughters: "Susie", "Patsy", and "Ginny". There are five adult grandchildren and, to Dad's great joy, one great-grandchild. Unfortunately, little Emily Ferrence lives in Los Angeles and so my dad knew her mainly through pictures and videos. Even so, he was incredibly proud of her and would buttonhole waitresses, nurses, and other total strangers to show off pictures. Luckily, my son and his family were East in September (2005) for my retirement dinner and so Dad got to meet her in person.

As we were growing up, Dad didn't talk much about the war or his time in the service (although we did find some very interesting "souvenirs" hidden in the attic) but in the last ten or fifteen years he began to think and talk about it quite a bit. His memories and old ties, especially with his pilot Jack Audiss (now the only surviving member of his crew), were very special to him and reconnecting with his plane crew and other members of the 820th Bomb Squadron brought him much joy. Dad started his military service at Selman Field in Monroe, LA. He then was stationed at Roswell, NM, Victorville, CA, and Greenville, NC. He flew with the 820th in B-25 Mitchell in the Pacific Theater. Dad really wanted to become a pilot but because he wore glasses, he trained and served as a navigator. But that dream never died and around the time he turned 70, he started taking flying lessons at a small local airport. At first he did this in secret but eventually realized he had to tell our mother before someone else did. He, despite a less than impressive night flight after which he had to solemnly swear to never fly again at night, earned his long desired pilot's license. After that he flew very little--apparently the real joy was in the achievement. As his daughters, my sisters knew and related to Dad in the usual way. In a household of four females, he faded into the background--perhaps to protect his sanity and/or manhood. And, of course, family dynamics were very different then. One of our mother's favorite sayings was that as one door opened, another door opened. This was certainly true for us and our dad. As we spent more and more time with him, we began to know and appreciate him for the individual that he was. We did more things together and, more importantly, talked more with him. As a result, during the last seven years, we gathered a wealth of special moments and precious memories. We came to appreciate him as loving, kind, compassionate, loyal, honest, honorable and, to our surprise, very, very funny. He was a good father, a good friend, and a good man. Our son spoke at Dad's funeral and of all the things he said, the one that stood out most was that Dad lived a life most marked by an absence of enemies. Sue (nee Susie Snyder) Ferrence
